## 6.12--POLICY FOR SERVICE ANIMALS IN DISTRICT FACILITIES

In accordance with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act, service dogs and trained miniature horses (hereinafter referred to as service animals) are permitted for used by individuals with disabilities on district property and district facilities provided the individuals and their animals meet the requirements and responsibilities covered in this policy.

When an individual with a disability seeks to bring a service animal into a district facility, the district is entitled to ask the individual if the animal is required because of a disability and what work or task the animal has been trained to perform. The district is not entitled to ask for documentation that the animal has been properly trained, but the individual bringing the animal into a district facility will be held accountable for the animal's behavior.

Any service animal brought into a district facility by an individual with a disability must have been trained to do work or perform tasks for the individual. The work or tasks performed by the service animal must be directly related to the handler's disability. Examples of work or tasks include, but are not limited to, assisting individuals who are blind or have low vision with navigation or other tasks, alerting individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing to the presence of people or sounds, providing non-violent protection, pulling a wheelchair, assisting an individual during a seizure, alerting individuals to the presence of allergens, retrieving items such as medicine, providing physical support and assistance with balance and stability to individuals with mobility disabilities, and helping persons with psychiatric and neurological disabilities by preventing or interrupting impulsive or destructive behaviors.

The crime deterrent effects of an animal's presence and the provision of emotional support, well-being, comfort, or companionship do *not* constitute work or tasks for the purposes of this policy.

Individuals with disabilities shall be permitted to be accompanied by their service animals in all areas of a public entity's facilities where members of the public, participants in services, programs or activities, or invitees, as relevant, are allowed to go.

A service animal shall be under the control of its handler. A service animal shall have a harness, leash, or other tether, unless either the handler is unable because of a disability to use a harness, leash, or other tether, or the use of a harness, leash, or other tether would interfere with the service animal's safe, effective performance of work or tasks, in which case the service animal must be otherwise under the handler's control by means of voice control, signals, or other effective means.

The District shall not ask or require an individual with a disability to pay a surcharge, even if people accompanied by pets are required to pay fees, or to comply with other requirements generally not applicable to people without pets.

The following conditions apply:

- 1. All service animals must be spayed or neutered.
- All service animals must have all required licenses and vaccines that are required for the City of Van Buren
- 3. All service animals must be treated for, and kept free of, fleas and ticks.
- 4. All service animals must be kept clean and groomed to avoid shedding and dander.
- 5. The animal must be a dog or, in specific circumstances, a miniature horse. No other species of animal, whether wild or domestic, will be permitted in schools as a "service animal".

- 6. Special provisions/Miniature horses: Requests to permit a miniature horse to accompany student or adult with a disability in school buildings, in classroom, or at school functions, will be handled on a case-by-case basis, considering:
  - The type, size, and weight of the miniature horse and whether the facility can accommodate these features.
  - Whether the handler has sufficient control of the miniature horse.
  - Whether the miniature horse is housebroken.
  - Whether the miniature horse's presence in a specific facility compromises legitimate safety requirements that are necessary for safe operation.
- 7. Removal of a Service Animal: A school administrator may ask an individual with a disability or his/her parents to remove a service animal from a school building, a classroom, or from a school function if any one of the following circumstances occurs:
  - The animal is out of control and the animal's handler does not take effective action to control it.
  - The animal is not housebroken.
  - Making reasonable accommodations for the animal's presence would "fundamentally alter" the nature of the service, program, or activity.

If the district excludes a service animal due to the reasons listed above, the district shall give the individual with a disability the opportunity to participate in the service, program, or activity without having the service animal on the premises.

- 8. The school system is not responsible for the care or supervision of a service animal, including walking the animal or responding to the animal's need to relieve itself. The handler will be required to remove and dispose of the service animal's solid waste left on school grounds. The handler may remove the waste and dispose in a non-leaking sealed bag and left in a trash basket.
  - The school district is not responsible for providing a staff member to walk the service animal or to provide any other care or assistance to the animal.
  - Students with service animals are expected to care for and supervise their animal. In the case of a young child or a student with disabilities who is unable to care for or supervise his/her service animal, the parent is responsible for providing care and supervision of the animal. Prior to working in the school, any person responsible for providing care and supervision of the animal must go through the same process for background checks as required of all employees of the school system. All background checks will be processed at the Administration Office in the Human Resources Department.
